BILL KING: THE CONSERVATIVE WHO COULD BE HOUSTON'S NEXT MAYOR ... AND WHY WE SHOULD CARE

In advance of every election, candidates and political parties pronounce that, "This is the most important election of our lifetime!" Without resorting to that level of

hyperbole, the case can be made that this year's face-off between **Bill King** and Sylvester Turner offers the greatest opportunity for a sea change at Houston City Hall in a decade-and-a-half. It is significant enough that every conservative and conservative-leaning voter should make plans to vote and drag as many like-minded friends to the polls as possible.

While it may be cliché to say that the difference between these two candidates is clear, it still remains true. True enough to say that the difference in ideology, perspective and experience will define the direction of Houston for many years. Houston, after all, faces an ever escalating pension crisis, streets in disrepair and an understaffed police department.

The answer to these and other challenges lies in a different approach, a different world view and a different scope of experience than those that created these problems in the first place. **Bill King** represents just

such a radical departure from the administration of Annise Parker. To be blunt, if you like Annise Parker and where she has taken Houston, then Sylvester Turner is probably already your choice. Like Parker, who has occupied elected office for the last

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eighteen years, Turner is a political insider, spending the last quarter of a century in the Texas Legislature. **King**, though, is a conservative and an outsider and will bring an outsider's perspective to the job as Houston's CEO.

Nowhere is that perspective needed as desperately as it is in the area of Houston's worsening pension crisis. Crisis is a strong word, but an appropriate one for this problem. After all, if unresolved, it threatens to suck up an increasing amount of city revenue until it becomes the single greatest budget item.

Much of what ails Houston in the area of pensions can be traced back to an unwillingness by career politicians to address the issue and to the Texas

Legislature, which several years ago decided to take control of Houston's pensions out of the hands of us at the local level and place it with the politicians in Austin. And what has Sylvester Turner done to solve this problem during his 25 years in the Legislature? Nothing, except getting extremely cozy with the unions whose self-interest in the issue is at odds with the interests of all of us, the taxpayers. The simple truth is that Turner is too ingrained with and beholden to the union special interests that block the path to resolution. King owes no such debt and has no qualms about shattering the status quo. If voters want to kick start our fiscal recovery by addressing this rather significant elephant in the room, Bill King is the obvious choice. This issue alone provides the imperative to elect King.

In a matter of days, Houstonians will elect a new CEO and Bill King is the most qualified of these two candidates to take on that role. King, after all, has the executive experience that his opponent lacks both as a business owner and as the former mayor of Kemah. King has executive experience, where Turner's is entirely legislative. Right now, Houston desperately needs a competent chief executive and Bill King is ready, willing and, most importantly, able to do that job. *

MAYOR: BILL KING

Bill King is the clear choice for Mayor.

Dr. Jack Christie's coordination and influence with the city's Human Resources Department has helped shift their focus from disease management to wellness promotion, which has taken the Health Benefits Fund Balance from being \$18 million in the red to \$43 million in the black, which is a \$61 million swing in favor of the taxpayer.
